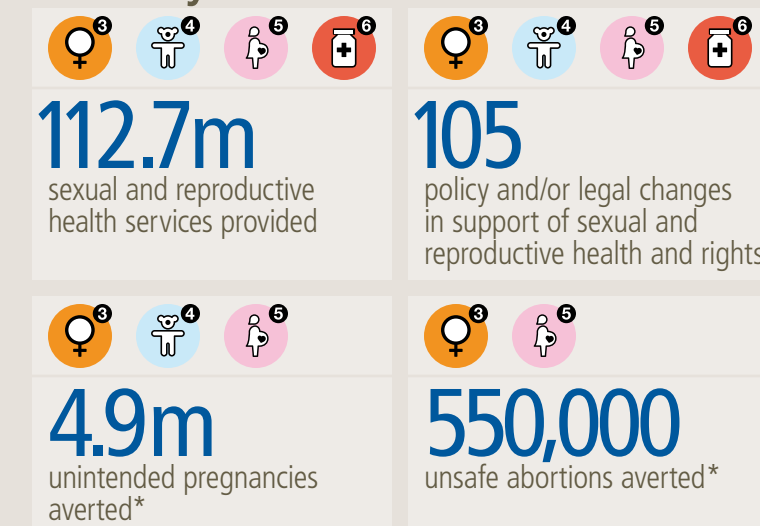

IPPF is a global service provider and a leading advocate of sexual and reproductive health and rights for all. We are a worldwide movement of national organizations working with and for communities and individuals.



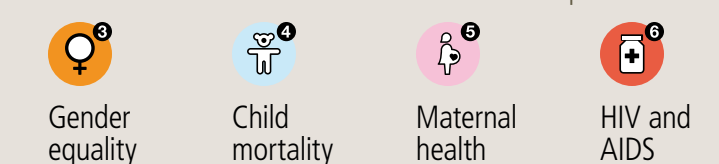

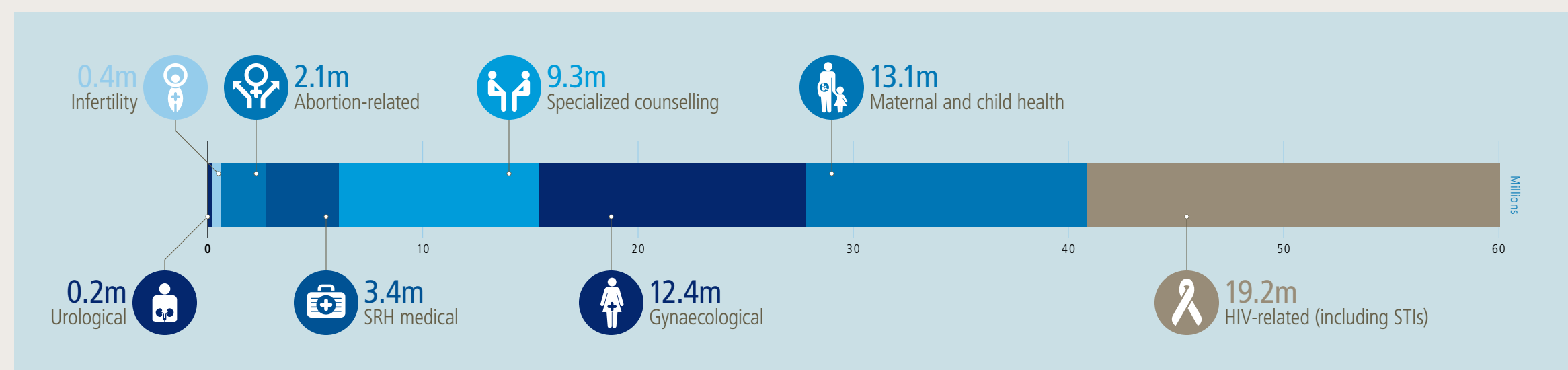
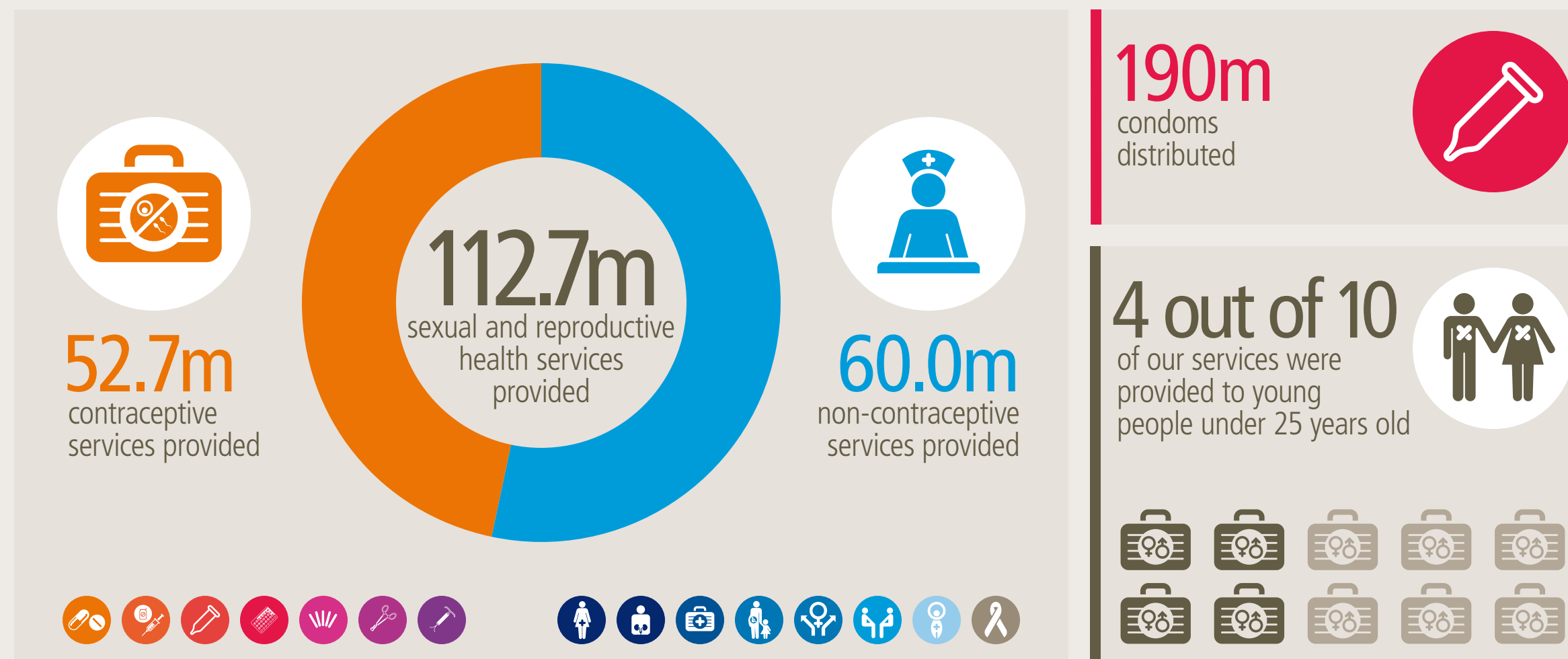
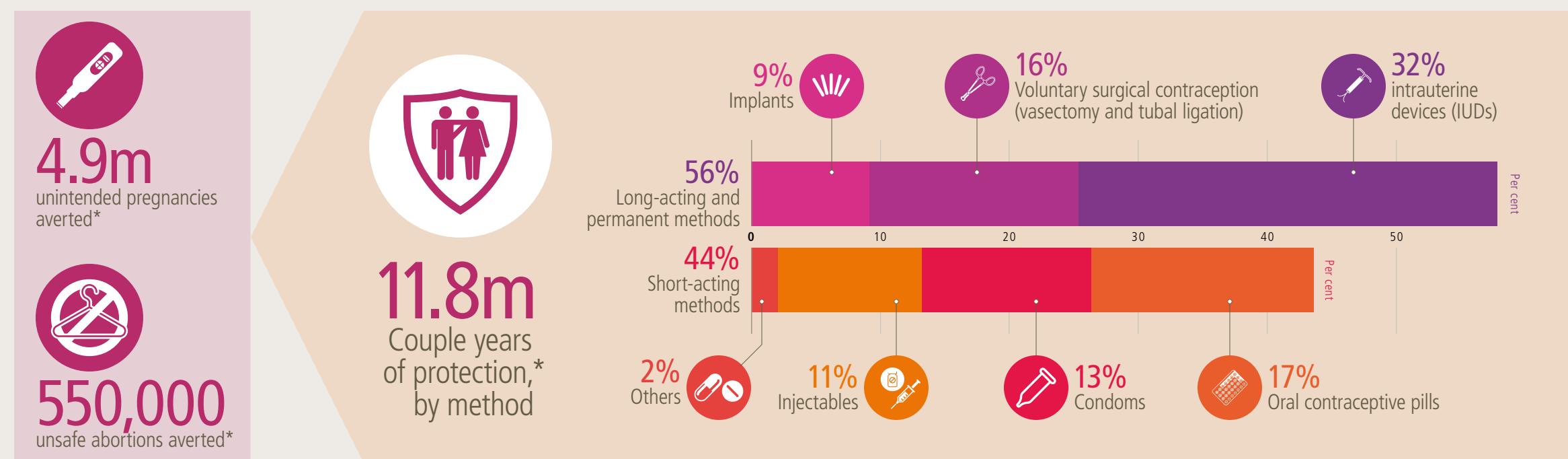


Service delivery results 2012

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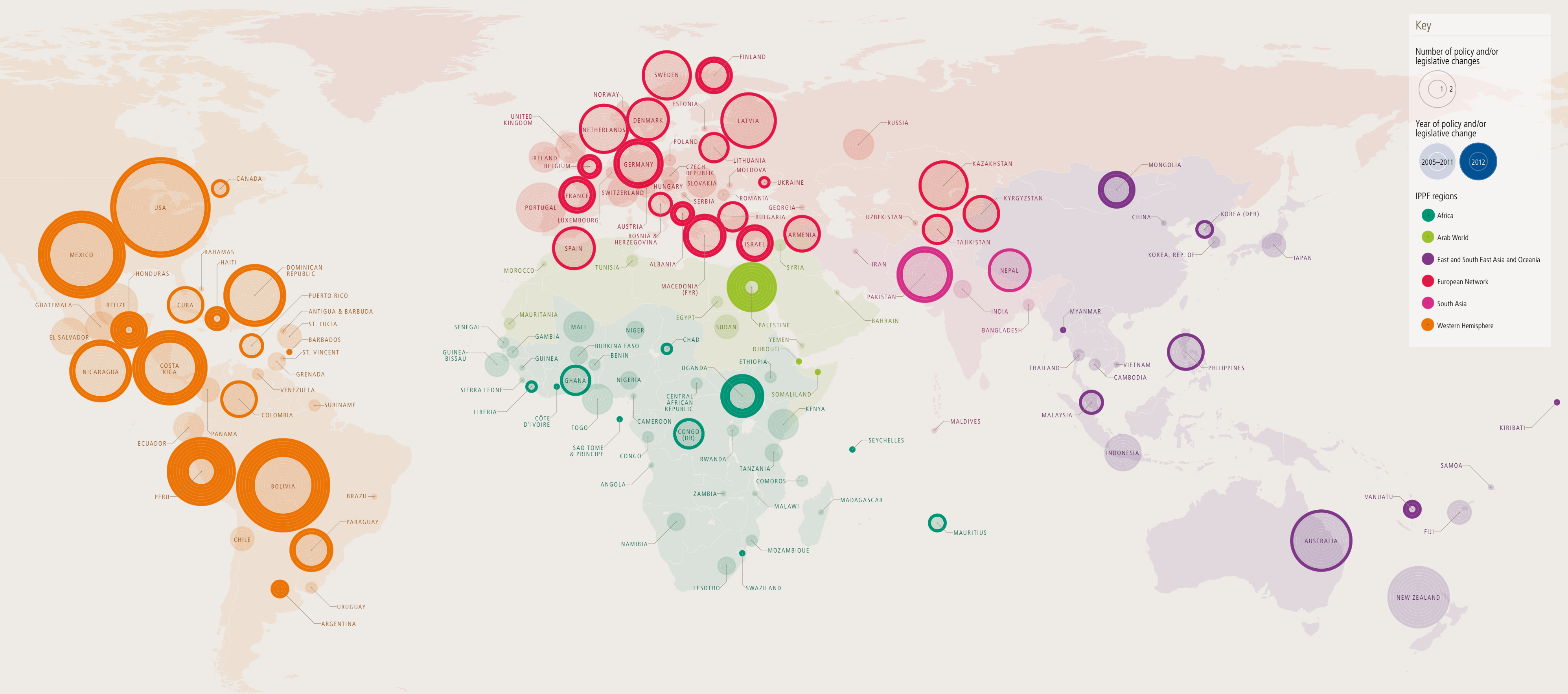

IPPF's advocacy creates an enabling environment to increase access to services, promote sexual rights and gender equality, and reduce stigma and discrimination. Member Associations make a significant difference to the lives of millions by advocating for changes to laws and policies in support of sexual and reproductive health and rights, and opposing those that are harmful.



Centro de Investigación,
Educación y Servicios (CIES)



The President of Bolivia issued a Supreme Decree that established mechanisms to prevent violence and mistreatment against children and adolescents in school. CIES designed a proposal and provided technical support to the government officials who developed the Decree.

Associação Santomense para
Promoção Familiar (ASPF)



IPPF's collaborating partner in São Tomé and Príncipe successfully advocated for abortion to be decriminalized. ASPF convinced decision makers, parliamentarians and community leaders to close certain loopholes in the penal code that had criminalized abortion.

Mauritius Family Planning and
Welfare Association (MFPWA)



MFPWA spent years working with other organizations and government officials to liberalize the country's abortion laws. People can now seek or provide an abortion under four circumstances without facing a minimum of 10 years' imprisonment, as was previously the case.

Palestinian Family Planning
and Protection Association (PFPPA)



In 2012, PFPPA's advocacy work led to a remarkable six changes in laws and policies, four of which criminalize violence against women. The country's penal code, for example, no longer gives men legal authority to kill their sisters, daughters or wives for committing adultery.

Somaliland Family Health
Association (SOFHA)



SOFHA worked with the Ministry of Health to issue a policy allowing women to give their own consent for emergency obstetric procedures when a male relative cannot be found. As a result, women will no longer die waiting for their male relatives to give permission for a Caesarean section.

Latvijas Ģimenes Plānošanas
un Seksuālas Veselības
Asociācija (Papardes Zieds)



The Latvian Member Association led a coalition of organizations to block a change in the definition of 'child' in the national child protection policy. The proposal was to define a 'child' as beginning at conception, which would have made abortion illegal under all circumstances.

Pan-Armenian Family Health
Association (PAFHA)



PAFHA provided recommendations to the Ministry of Health to revise the law to reduce barriers to accessing safe abortion services. As a result, the Ministry removed legal conditions requiring women to have an HIV test and ultrasound before an abortion procedure.

Rahnuma-Family Planning
Association of Pakistan
(Rahnuma-FPAP)



Rahnuma-FPAP led a successful advocacy initiative to include the Minimum Initial Service Package (MISP) in seven provincial disaster management plans. Inclusion of the MISP will ensure women and newborn health is prioritized during disaster and emergency situations.

Mongolian Family Welfare
Association (MFWA)



MFWA actively participated in a review of Mongolia's HIV prevention law, removing a number of negative clauses. These included mandatory disclosure of status by people living with HIV to doctors, spouses or border officials, and compulsory HIV testing for all job applicants.

Family Planning Organization
of the Philippines (FPOP)



After 14 years of committed advocacy by FPOP and partners, a reproductive health bill finally became law in 2012. The bill, which faced robust opposition from religious groups, guarantees universal access to contraception, access to safe post-abortion care, and maternal and newborn care.
